## **S.C.O.P.E. PROGRAMS**

***Choose to become involved in any of these programs:***

**Business Prowl Checks:** Volunteers track local area business locations detailing patrol needs

**Centennial Trail:** Volunteers work with the Park Service to patrol trail and trail heads

**Community Resource Referrals:** Volunteers assist citizens with neighborhood concerns and act as a resource to link up with services

**C.E.R.T (Community Emergency Response Teams)** Volunteers assist first responders by taking care of themselves and others in their communities for first three days following a disaster

**COP-Citizens On Patrol:** Volunteers patrol neighborhoods and act as extra eyes and ears for the Sheriff's Office

**Court Monitor:** Volunteers monitor traffic and civil court cases to reduce dismissals of cases and fines

**Data Entry:** Volunteers help with special projects entering data for the Sheriff Office

**Flagging:** Volunteers provide traffic control at public events

**Graffiti Task Force:** Volunteers document graffiti and assist in cleanup

**Handicap Parking Patrol:** Volunteers issue handicap parking citations and educate the public on ADA (Americans Disability Act)

**Mounted Patrol:** Volunteers patrol back country and urban areas on horseback, perform search and rescue and homeland security detail

**Neighborhood Watch:** Volunteers develop a neighbor-to-neighbor link to crime prevention and disaster preparedness

**Operation Family ID:** Volunteers fingerprint and take digital pictures of children for use by law enforcement officials, when a child would become lost or kidnapped

**Pawn Detail:** Volunteers record pawned merchandise data for review by Detectives

**Radar Reader Board:** Volunteers use radar equipment to document speeding in the community and report back to the traffic office

**Resource Referrals:** Volunteers provide community referral information

**School Patrol:** Volunteers help keep children safe in and around schools

**S.C.O.P.E. Basics:** Initial training needed by volunteers to educate them about opportunities to volunteer in the S.C.O.P.E. program

**Sheriff's Front Desk:** Volunteers answer phones, take reports, handle complaints and respond to public inquiries

**SIRT (S.C.O.P.E. Incidence Response Team):** Volunteers secure emergency scenes such as street closures and rerouting traffic for emergencies and crime scene investigation

**Special Detail:** Volunteers work with law enforcement special units as requested.

**Venturing Scout Program:** High School students develop leadership skills through involvement in their communities

**Vacation Home Checks:** Volunteers patrol over 60 residences at homeowner's requests

**Victim Call Backs:** Volunteers work with Property Crimes Detectives calling victims of property crimes to report updates on their case
