Voting will occur at the IACP Annual Conference on Monday October 25<sup>th</sup>. - I encourage all U&CPS members attending the conference to cast their ballot during the scheduled voting period. ### Annual Meeting

The U&CPS annual meeting will be held from 11:00 AM – 2:00 PM in the Orlando Convention Center on Sunday October 24, 2010 in rooms 309 A & B. A box lunch will be provided for U&CPS members attending the conference. We have not solicited "reservations" for the lunch meeting this year; but, have ordered 60 box lunches.

### Reception at the Annual Conference

Our reception this year will be a “joint” reception with the Florida Police Chiefs Association (FPCA) during the evening of Sunday October 24, 2010 from 7:00 PM – 11:00 PM at the Rosen Plaza Hotel near the convention center. Chief Richard Beary and the Florida Police Chiefs Association will be acting as hosts.

### Leadership Team Activities

October 4, 2009 – organization meeting and discussion in Denver; including, conference call schedule, potential changes to scholarship program, need to update the by-laws, modifying recruitment and membership coordination, and training activities and plans.

January 21, 2010 – conference call to discuss agenda for Chief Mike Alsup’s attendance at IACP Legislative Day, membership recruitment, Mid-year meeting in conjunction with IACLEA Conference in St. Louis, initial planning for Annual Meeting in Orlando, By-laws update, scholarship qualification criteria, FBI emphasis on LEO, General Chair update on IACP Executive Committee conference call and meeting, etc.

March 25, 2010 – conference call to discuss Chief Alsup’s legislative day report, St. Louis Mid-year meeting agenda, Chief Beary’s bid for IACP 4<sup>th</sup>. Vice President, Pennsylvania campus police bill, and the potential “community policing professional” designation that may become a reality through the University of Illinois.

May 6, 2010 – conference call to discuss final arrangements for Mid-Year meeting, Annual Meeting agenda and planning, General Chair update on IACP Executive Committee meeting, etc.

June 21, 2010 – discussion and activity updates at Mid-year meeting in St. Louis.

September 9, 2010 – conference call to finalize Annual Meeting agenda preferences, reception information, etc.

### General Chair Activities – meetings attended

December 15, 2009 – conference call with President Michael Carroll, Executive Director Dan Rosenblatt, IACP staff, and designated section/committee chairs to discuss the recommendations and actions of the IACP Committee on Committees; solicit input and feedback for improving operation of and support received by sections and committees, and opportunity to brief on goals and objectives for the coming year.

January 15-16, 2010 – IACP Executive Committee Meeting in Miami Beach, FL.

April 16-17, 2010 – IACP Executive Committee Meeting in Scottsdale, AZ.

August 13-14, 2010 – IACP Executive Committee Meeting in Philadelphia, PA

General Vice Chair's Report (Chief Paul Glowacki, St. Mary's University)

It has been relatively busy since our annual meeting last year in Denver and I welcome the future challenges of my position with the IACP University and College Police Section (U&CPS).

During this reporting period, I have made myself available for IACP U&CPS issues, conference calls and to serve as a resource for the regional vice chairs on recruitment of membership along with other matters of concern.

I continue to serve and represent IACP U&CPS and IACLEA on the FBI CJIS UCR Subcommittee. In April 2010, that Subcommittee met in San Antonio, TX. At that meeting, I made a motion under the topic of UCR Quality Assurance Reviews for the FBI to continue with their processes of audits, but to discontinue their Memorandum of Understanding with the Department of the Education (DOE) in their joint reviews of universities and colleges. All audits would be conducted separately. This would include a university from every state and the FBI would report back to the DOE if there are discrepancies found with an audit at a college or university.

The purpose of this topic was to discuss some concerns regarding the audit process that Department of Education (DOE) does in conjunction with the UCR Quality Assurance Review. The main concern is the FBI teaming up with the DOE to go in and conduct joint audits on UCR Numbers or crime statistics on University and College police agencies.

I mentioned to the Subcommittee, once the FBI notifies a college or university that there is going to be audit conducted on their UCR numbers, the DOE becomes aware of the audit through the FBI and conducts their own compliance audit at the same time. The DOE's audit is to ensure University and Colleges are complying with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act (also known as the Clery Act). The DOE attach themselves to UCR Quality Assurance Review process and does their own compliance audit in respect to the University's crime statistics. So, not only do you have auditors from the FBI on campus, you also have auditors from the DOE. It is a staffing nightmare to support these audits.

Another major concern brought up is that not all University Police agencies are submitting UCR data because it is a voluntary program for police agencies. However, all University and Colleges are mandated by federal law to report crime statistics to the DOE. So, one is a voluntary program and the other is mandated by law. Universities agencies submitting UCR data are concerned that if they are identified by the FBI for a

Quality Assurance Review, they are automatically the focus of a DOE audit because their university agency decided to submit UCR data to the FBI, voluntarily.

Finally, is the issue if you are going to be called upon by UCR that you are going to be audited, it is a learning opportunity, and not a punitive action. Change or correct the data or inaccurate information and it is over. However, if the DOE conducts an audit, fines may be assessed associated with inaccurate information being found by auditors. These fines start at \$27,500 for each violation.

Following some discussion on the topic, I made the aforementioned motion for the FBI to continue with their processes of audits, but to discontinue their Memorandum of Understanding with the Department of the Education (DOE) in their joint reviews of universities and colleges. All audits would be conducted separately. This would include a university from every state and the FBI would report back to the DOE if there are discrepancies found with an audit at a college or university.

The motion was unanimously supported by the Subcommittee by a vote and this issue will now be addressed at the next meeting of the FBI CJIS Advisory Policy Board (APB) being held in Columbus (OH) in June, 2010. I have been asked by the Subcommittee to be present at the meeting to address any questions by the FBI CJIS APB.

I updated the membership on the FBI CJIS UCR Subcommittee motion at the scheduled IACP U&CPS Mid-Year Luncheon Meeting on June 21<sup>st</sup> in St. Louis.

On another topic, I was able to coordinate training opportunities for University and College Police Section members to occur in south central Texas over the course of the next year or so. The training opportunities included, Survival Training for Women in Police (August 2010/San Antonio, TX), Dangerous and Illicit Drug Use on College Campuses provided by the DEA (August 2010/San Marcos, TX) and a Terrorism Seminar 2011 (March 2011/San Antonio, TX).

#### Scholarship Committee Chair's – report (Dr. Richard Martin, Mercer University)

Scholarship Committee member's included Michael Bicking (West Chester University Police), Meloyde Batten-Mickens (Gallaudet University) and myself. The committee only received three applications for review and selection. Based upon their applications materials, Brett LaVelle from UW-Milwaukee and Tiffany Roth from University of Scranton were each awarded a \$1,000 scholarship.

Legislative Committee Chair's report (Chief Michael Alsup, Harper College)

On March 8, 2010 I traveled to IACP Headquarters for the 2010 IACP Day on the Hill briefing, representing the University & College Police Section. The briefing was conducted by Gene Voegtlin, IACP Legislative Counsel.

On March 9, 2010 I represented the U&CPS at Day On The Hill, delivering the IACP Legislative Agenda for the 111<sup>th</sup> Congress). My work for the day is described below.



I represented the U&CPS at Senator Jim Webb's press conference, in the Capitol building, urging a Senate vote on the National Criminal Justice Commission Act of 2010 ([http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=5niWvYJ\\_uuE](http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=5niWvYJ_uuE) [I'm at 1:44] ) and here's a picture of Senator Webb, with me over his left shoulder. While at the press conference I spoke briefly with Senator Jim Webb (VA), Senator Lindsay Graham (SC), Senator Arlen Specter (PA) and Senator Orrin Hatch (UT) (all of the Senate Judiciary Committee) – thanking them all for their work and support of this very important bill.

Later in the day I represented the U&CPS in a meeting with Senate Majority Whip, Senator Richard Durbin – Illinois at his Capitol office. Among the topics discussed were Cocaine Sentencing Disparity, Immigrations Reform and the FCC Block D auction. Senator Durbin questioned us on Healthcare and public safety jobs lost in the current economy. I thanked Senator Durbin for his co-sponsorship of the National Criminal Justice Commission Act of 2010.

I also met with Mr. Mark Roman (staffer) for Representative Schock (IL), Senator Roland Burris (IL) Mr. Douglas Platz (staffer) for Representative Foster (IL), Mr. Chris Sarley (staffer and former Chief Legislative Aide for Speaker of the House, Dennis Hastert (IL) for Representative Shimkus (IL), Ms. Lisa Radogno (staffer) for Representative Kirk (IL), Mr. Sam Hodas (staffer) for Representative Bean (IL), Mr. Griffin Foster (staffer) for Representative Biggert (IL), Mr. Masao Doi (staffer) for Representative Halverson (IL). While with Senator Burris I thanked him for his co-sponsorship of the National Criminal Justice Commission Act of 2010, So, in the end, I delivered personal messages from the U&CPS, Illinois delegation and the IACP Legislative Agenda for the 111<sup>th</sup> Congress to both Illinois Senators (including the House Majority Whip) and seven Representative from Illinois urging them all to support the IACP Legislative Agenda and to count on me personally, representing the College and University Section for any questions they may have regarding legislative matters, pertaining to colleges and universities, nationwide.

Since returning to Harper College on March 11, 2010, I've sent personal letters to each legislator I've mentioned, thanking them for seeing and listening to me, delivered an additional copy of the IACP Legislative Agenda for the 111<sup>th</sup> Congress, and assured them that we, the U&CPS are interested in working with them on matters affecting our workplaces.

Since March 2010, I mailed updates regarding IACP's work on the FCC Block D auction proposal to each of these legislators, asking for their intervention three times.

I also attended the National Campus Law Enforcement Leadership Institute on Violence Against Women conducted by IACP this summer at the University of Texas in Austin.

#### Reports from Regional Vice Chairs

##### North Atlantic Region – Chief Ed Shupp, Lehigh University Police (CT, DC, DE, MA, MD, ME, NH, NJ, NY, PA, RI)

I attended the IACLEA/New Jersey CUPSA regional conference in April 2010 and discussed with the group benefits of joining IACP and the University & College Police Section.

An important issue with the Pennsylvania group is the proposed legislation/rewrite of Title 22 § 501 to bring college and university law enforcement under control of the MPOETC (Municipal Police Officers Education and Training Commission) which requires standards and oversight for all sworn agencies.

##### South Region – Chief Jeff Johns, Holmes Community College Police (AL, AR, FL, GA, LA, MS, NC, OK, SC, TN, TX, VA, WV)

I attended the Summer MSACP meeting in Biloxi and used the opportunity to solicit both new members and to bring awareness of the section.

I was appointed the US Attorney's LECC for the Southern Federal District and we have promoted 9 college police trainings since that time.

I have solicited college chiefs in 9 of the 13 states in my regional via phone and email.

I maintain good contact with the MS Campus Law Enforcement Association, serve as a member of IACLEA's government relations committee and recruited for IACP at any LE venue in and outside of my region.
